



Helper, a town named after the helper engines used to push train cars up the steep grade to Soldier Summit, is a small historic town with a rich history. Settled in 1881, immigrants came from all over the world in search of a better life working in the mines or on the railroads, creating a cultural tapestry unlike another in Utah. By the 1920s, at least 27 languages could be heard on Helper Main Street.

The Helper Museum is housed in the old Hotel Helper. Exhibits showcase everything from artifacts of the coal camp life to a collection of photographs by the famous documentary photographer Dorothea Lange. You are sure to find something here that will leave a lasting impression and make you glad you stopped by.
